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THE CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

The California Community College System is the largest system of higher education in the world serving 2.5 million students on 113 college campuses throughout California (see map on page 34 for locations). Community colleges offer a smooth transition to a four-year institution. **Sixty percent of students who received their bachelor's degree at a California State University and 30 percent of students who graduated from a UC school started their education at a California Community College.** Eighty percent of the students who attend a community college also work at the same time. Per unit cost is \$46, however most schools also have mandatory service fees.

Most community college campuses, like four-year institutions, provide a large variety of services to assist students in pursuing their educational and career goals. Such services include: academic advising; disabled student services; honors programs; learning and tutoring programs; scholarships; child care; and career center.

For many students, the community college offers a quality lower-division academic or vocational college education at value prices while living at home. Programs include:

- **Bachelor's degree programs** at 15 California colleges.
- Associate degree programs in arts and sciences (lower division requirements).
- Certificate programs in arts, sciences, technical and occupational fields such as health, business and finance, electronics, computer sciences, agriculture, police and fire science, food science, and building and landscaping trades.
- Credit and non-credit classes.
- English training.
- Citizenship classes.
- Remedial or "catch-up" classes.



From a consumer's standpoint, students would be well advised to see if programs are offered at community colleges before enrolling in a costly two-year private technical or occupational school.

There are four ways to be eligible to attend a community college:

- Be a high school graduate.
OR
- Be an apprentice (as defined by section 3077 of the labor code) and demonstrate that you are capable of benefiting from the instruction offered.
OR
- Be eighteen years of age and demonstrate that you are capable of benefiting from the instruction offered.
OR
- Be approved as a concurrently enrolled K-12 student with approval of a local K-12 school or district in accordance with Education Code sections 48800 - 48802 and 76001 - 76002.



Benefits of the Citrus College Honors Track

Among the benefits of being a part of the Citrus College Honors Transfer Program are:

- small class sizes offering individualized interaction between faculty and students.
- academic and social interaction with other highly motivated and successful students.
- Citrus College's membership in the UCLA Transfer Alliance Program, which increases the likelihood of a successful transfer application to UCLA.
- Citrus College Honors Transfer agreements with local colleges and universities that provide priority processing on transfer applications, as well as other benefits.
- Honors transfer identification on transcripts which offers advantages on transfer and employment applications.
- priority registration.
- opportunities to participate in honors conferences and seminars.
- enhanced scholarship opportunities.
- special recognition at graduation.


Through small class sizes and high levels of interaction, the honors transfer program fosters the formation of learning cohorts. Students will typically share multiple classes together which helps form a community of shared learning. Students have commented that real friendships have formed through the honors transfer program and, oftentimes, students will transfer to a four-year institution together, or know former Citrus College honors students who already attend that institution.

You may also join the Beta Nu Eta Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, a nationally recognized society for students with a 3.25 GPA and 12 or more units of college credit and/or the Citrus College Iota Chapter of Alpha Gamma Sigma, a California community college honor society for students with a 3.0 GPA and 12 or more units of college credit.
